Rwanda A visit full of surprise

In June I was delighted to travel to Rwanda with Revd Dr Andrew Ashdown from Global Relations. As co-ordinator for the whole of Africa, Andrew had a wealth of knowledge and experience which he was generous to share. We were the guest of Bishop Samuel as head of the Free Methodist Church in Rwanda.

It was for me a visit full of surprises.

Having been told to pack for their hot summer the temperature dropped to around 17 degrees as soon as I arrived and I was accused of bringing the British weather with me. Although it was hot at times much of Rwanda is green and hilly and even has its own rain forest so the climate was very comfortable.

I was able to travel from the border with Uganda to the border with Congo and see the rich variety of the landscape from dry and dusty to lush and tropical with some mountains thrown in for good measure. Rwanda was incredibly beautiful. It is also the cleanest country in Africa. There is a strong environmental policy with plastic bags declared as illegal and single use plastics discouraged. In the capital Kigali I can honestly say I did not see any litter on the streets There is a citizens charter where each citizen is expected to give time back to their community, every two weeks.



Rwanda is amazingly self sufficient, growing fruit, rice and vegetables. Their coffee is amazing and I particularly enjoyed fresh pineapple and bananas for breakfast every morning of my stay. The picture shows me meeting the ladies from 'A friend in need cooperative' growing pineapples in the hills

On a more sombre note I was able to visit two of the many genocide memorials which was very moving. I had not fully registered that the genocide was thirty years ago and the churches are still heavily involved in peace and reconciliation work. Despite some issues regarding public health and safety the church is thriving and active.

I was also able to explore the role of women in the five year plan for the church. I was pleased to see that enabling and empowering the role of women was visible in every section. I was able to visit the theological college where women candidates are increasing year on year.

Bishop Samuel invited me to preach on Pentecost Sunday as he hoped it would encourage other women. The jury may be out on this but it was an immense privilege.

A Whirlwind Year Leonora Wassell CoChair

Well, what a whirlwind of a year it has been. When I took on the responsibilities of CoChair of Methodist Women in Britain, little did I know I would travel around the connexion, go to New York, impersonate Susanna Wesley, attend Edinburgh Pride and be invited to Sri Lanka.

I wished to meet as many people as I could when I took office, so I embarked on a series of visits to District Days across the Connexion,



from Cornwall to Manchester, Lincoln to London, Beds, Herts & Essex to Southampton, West Yorkshire to Northumberland and Birmingham to Stockport. It was a delight to meet so many members and hear what was going on in the different areas, the projects they supported, the amazing efforts to raise funds & the depth of spirituality displayed.

Just two weeks after I returned from New York, we had our yearly Conference at the Hayes Centre, Swanwick. We had a packed & varied programme, with Keynote speaker Rev Dr Sonia Hicks, workshops, worship, and entertainment. It was very moving to see 200 women sing "Christ be my light". On the Saturday evening we had an open mike night in which we were entertained by a variety of acts. Susanna Wesley (aka Rainbow Rev) compered the night.

June was an extremely busy month. It began with the inaugural session of the Ghanaian Women's Fellowship in Telford on 1 June, where Olive and I were treated to 4 hours of exuberant worship and generous gifts.

It was agreed by the Exec that I would tour Scotland and the Shetland Islands accompanied by Barbara Harrison, the area Trustee. We enjoyed 4 days on Shetland, being shown around by the MWiB Ambassador, Deacon Elizabeth Colley. We saw a



variety of projects, visited historical sights, and enjoyed the renowned hospitality of the people of Shetland. Our funniest moment was sat on the ferry to Yell. Not able to climb the steep steps to where the passengers sat, we were given two office chairs on the car deck to make the crossing. We giggled all the way as we watched peoples faces as they saw us.

We then embarked on our tour of Scotland, calling at Inverness, Perth, Glasgow and Edinburgh, sharing my talk on the Status of Women – a way forward.

We had the opportunity of meeting with the team that run the Women's Hub in Dundee, the Recovery Church in Glasgow, and the Bike Shed in Inverness. Amazing projects within the community. The unexpected bonus for me was attending Edinburgh Pride. We stood outside Augustine URC church with placards that proclaimed, "All are loved by God". All those marching applauded us which made me quite emotional. The following morning, I had the privilege of preaching at The City of Edinburgh Methodist Church.

I had one day after I returned before I set off for the Methodist Conference. I had been invited to attend the Global Relations Pre-Conference meeting with our overseas partners. It was fascinating to hear the work of Methodists in other countries. We had an opportunity to share what issues we face going forward. I was particularly interested in the work going on in Sri Lanka with the War Widows so when I spoke to Rebecca Boardman, Deputy Director of Global Relationships, about my possible overseas visit next year I asked if I could go to Sri Lanka. That afternoon she approached me and asked if I was free in August, this year. I have been invited to attend the Methodist Conference of Sri Lanka beginning on 20 August. I will also get to see some of the projects undertaken by the church. More about that visit in our next newsletter.

Meeting and greeting at District days for example enabled me to challenge the myths that impacted our image. Men are welcome... We campaign... We write worship materials.. Who would have thought it?

I am saying au revoir rather than goodbye as I will be supporting Annah as an ambassador when I step down and hope to see you all at future events including Swanwick. Thank you for all that we shared during my three years
I am confident that Leonora and Olive will take us forward in amazing ways.

HKMS Report Madeleine Reed

It is strange to be looking back at the months just gone – I didn't write a report in the last newsletter because I hadn't done anything noteworthy, but now I've got a lot to talk about!

Back in May, I was settling into a new church. God had unexpectedly called me out of my lovely village Methodist church into quite a large nondenominational church in a nearby town. My sister and her husband had both been baptised there on Easter Sunday and I had done an Alpha Course with them (it isn't just for new Christians, you know). Suddenly, I found myself in a totally alien context – a large church with lots of families, young children, and even young men, a solid half an hour of singing before the sermon, and so little structure that I didn't know one week to the next whether the service would finish at 11:30 or 1pm. It felt like plunging it at the deep end, but I also loved it, and am still loving it; I've been attending for some months now and have started finding my feet.

At the end of May, I went with our Co-Chair Leonora Wassell to Cliff Fest, a wonderful festival at Cliff College in Derbyshire. I knew so little about Cliff College, despite having heard the name a great deal, that I didn't even know it was Methodist until we were on site.

Leonora and I were running the MWiB stall together in the Market Hub. We were well-placed and made good friends with the other stallholders around us. Leonora, knowing that I had never been to a Christian festival like this before, manned (or womaned?) the stall while I went to different seminars, lectures, and worship services – some of which can be found on the Cliff College YouTube channel.

I have to contain myself here – I had such a good time, I could quite probably write a whole pamphlet on it. I'll limit myself to describing some of the events.

I attended the three main Bible studies lead every morning by Ben Pugh, one of the lecturers. The theme of the festival was Holiness Calling, and the Bible studies were all based around Isaiah 6:1-8, one of my favourite passages of Scripture from which we get the beautiful worship song I the Lord of sea and sky. Many of the other events I attended were based around the same scripture.

I also attended a series of three seminars hosted by Leslie Newton, Yorkshire North & East District Chair. They were titled Spreading Scriptural Holiness, and looked back on the behaviours and structures of the early Methodist movement, reflecting on how the modern Methodist Church might reclaim the passion, purpose, and power of our pioneering predecessors, if you'll forgive me the alliteration.

Upon returning home from this exciting and somewhat overwhelming festival, I was walking on air with enthusiasm and applied to Cliff College's gap year programme, in the hopes of spending a year in the beautiful Peak District in Christian community – and with access to their library. When I was refused, it was gently suggested to me that I might be better suited to their one-year undergraduate course on Theology and Mission. I applied, and was accepted, so from September this year, I will be a fulltime student for the first time since I was eight years old!



In June, I had the wonderful opportunity to visit Epworth, as I was invited to speak at the Lincolnshire District Day hosted at Wesley

Memorial Methodist Church. I was rather intimidated to be speaking in such an historic venue, but I was thrilled, too. The theme of my

talk was The Challenge of Comfort, the upshot of which was that we as Christians are called to comfort those who suffer in a way which doesn't count the cost or worry about being made uncomfortable itself – in short, self-sacrificially. We were served by the delightful men of the church who were as good at making conversation as they were at making tea; I was very glad to have met them.



After the talk, we relocated to Epworth Old Rectory, the family home of the Wesley family. We had a guided tour by a kind man who obviously knew his stuff by heart, which was fantastic, and we had cake, which was also fantastic. Having had my mind and body nourished by these treats, I was happy to return to the comfortable home I was being hosted in and have my heart nourished too by the quieter and gentler fellowship of an evening walk and a hot meal.

All this was possible because God is so good and, following my car crash in March, provided me with a new car in record time.

Come August, I will not only be packing for my year at Cliff College, but I will also be entering into my final year as the Helen Kim Memorial Scholar. The adverts are all out, the publicity is up – please do get the word out, because an opportunity like this five-year leadership development programme really is once in a lifetime, and it's lifechanging. I began my time with MWiB as a small, timid, anxious girl, and I come away as a confident, sociable woman of God.

My next report will likely be all about coursework, lectures, and theology textbooks—I'll apologise in advance... Even if I'm not that sorry.





Remembering Joan Stott—WFMUCW World Secretary (1996-2001)

Pam Stenson (Ambassador Darlington) says this wonderful tribute to Joan Stott of Australia who died recently may be of wider interest. Pam says 'I had the honour & great privilege of knowing Joan for many years from early 1990s onwards - she was a woman of faith and of prayerful action who will be missed all around the world by Methodist & Uniting Church Women. It's very fitting that she will be remembered at the World Assembly next year 2026 in New Zealand, within Joan's home South Pacific Area'.
